

Accelerating Apprenticeship Opportunities

Delaware's three vocational-technical school districts have worked to align five of their high school and adult education programs to provide dual enrollment and apprenticeship credits in high-growth sectors for 900+ students before high school graduation. Industries include:



Through its sectoral partnership – the First State Tech Partnership – the Tech Council of Delaware designed three new workforce programs, of which, the Yes, We Tech! summer internship program was the first to launch its inaugural cohort in June 2023. Yes, We Tech! has empowered rising high school juniors and seniors from diverse backgrounds with a captivating seven-week paid internship experience to build in-demand workplace skills, achieve digital proficiency, and attain an industry certification. The ultimate purpose of the program is to ensure that high school students have the essential skills required to compete in the labor market for high-wage employment after completing high school and/or college.
