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
All students graduate high school prepared with knowledge and skills to successfully enter the workforce, pursue postsecondary education, and continue learning throughout their lifetime.

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At any age, all students and their families identify, access, and utilize information, resources, and supports to help them pursue their goals.

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All students take advantage of opportunities to explore their career options, leadership roles, and gain real world experience.





DELAWARE'S WORK UNDERWAY FOR PREPARING STUDENTS FOR COLLEGE AND CAREERS

ELEMENTARY/ MIDDLE SCHOOL

Students prepare for high school with **advanced coursework and experiential learning** opportunities.



Educators help students identify postsecondary, career, and educational goals as early as middle school and develop a plan to reach them.

HIGH SCHOOL

Career-related courses and pathways connect students to the real world, and allow them to earn industry-recognized credentials. Curricula for these courses is developed by local business leaders, schools, and colleges.

College-level coursework such as Advanced Placement, dual enrollment, and International Baccalaureate opportunities prepare high schoolers for college.

Educators, counselors, and community partners help students and families identify college and career options, develop educational goals, and provide application and selection support and transition information in-person or online.

Counselors, advisors, and community partners promote **affordability via financial aid and scholarship** information and application supports.

POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION

Certification, 2-year, 4-year, Apprenticeship

Students complete coursework that prepares them for career interests and opportunities.

Students receive advice on relevant coursework and career opportunities.

CAREER AND MILITARY

Continuing education, professional development, and on-the-job training propel careers to new heights.

Workforce training grants and scholarships provide continuing education and professional development.



State, school, community, and institutional stakeholders **collaborate and align resources** to help young people. Schools partner with **community and nonprofit organizations** to provide mentoring and additional supports.

Students gain **volunteer and leadership experience** through afterschool and community programs.

Career awareness begins as early as middle school with online platforms to explore different careers, plus career coaches, mentors, and guest speakers. Students develop knowledge and skills for the workplace by moving from **career awareness to career exploration, preparation, and immersion** while developing their resumes, interacting with career coaches and mentors, and developing job skills through workbased learning like co-ops and internships.

As career options become more clearly defined, students actively **prepare** for and participate in the workforce, gaining skills, and building resumes through internships and

apprenticeships.

Delawareans utilize online platforms for further **resumebuilding and job seeking** to pursue new career opportunities.
